# Maine downtowns offer interesting events and places to explore this



Sebago Lake Distillery is a new addition in Gardiner and Cushnoc Brewing has opened along Water Street in downtown Augusta and includes brick oven pizza. 
# Major changes happening at Colonial Theater

You may have noticed a flurry of activity recently at the Colonial Theater, but did you know that this activity is the first step to a major change?

Beginning in March, construction crews began the process of abatement by removing the last bit of asbestos from the grounds of the theater. Gary Peachey, head of the Building Committee for Augusta Colonial Theater noted that asbestos had long mixed with debris and dust on old tanks and on metal items beneath the main floor, hindering efforts to repair and resurface the gaping hole near the stage.

Now, however, with the abatement process begun, the theater can once again resume construction and make the substantial repairs necessary to the subfloor, a significant change that will forever alter the look of the theater and signify yet another step towards full revitalization.


### New **Apartments** coming to Water Street

evelopers of a historic four-building block space on Water Street are planning to add 23 units, along with amenities that will include an office coworking space, a gym, a restaurant and retail

Previously used for offices, the 43,000 square-foot space will house apartments ranging from mid-market rate to highend, and will be the largest residential construction to occur downtown since the completion of the lofts at the old Ferrell's building at 283 Water St.

"We believe there should be an opportunity for everybody to live in a good place," said Andrew LeBlanc, a managing partner of Mastview Development which is overseeing the project.

The development will go up for review to the planning board on April 10. If approved, construction will break ground this summer and the building will be ready for occupancy by April 2019.

### Artwalk, Cruise-Ins and The Great Race this summer

ardiner Artwalk takes place three times each year on the first Friday of May, August, and December and features unique works of art ranging from paintings, drawings, fine art prints and photography to textiles, sculpture, jewelry and ceramics.

First launched in 2005 by Artdogs studios and a handful of other area artists, the mission of ArtWalk Gardiner is to increase community awareness and appreciation of the visual arts, to encourage interaction with local artists and the public, and to nurture a supportive network that also enhances the local economy. Summer events starts to kick into high gear mid-May as the popular Classic Car Cruise-In reopens for the weekly show on Thursday evenings 5-7 p.m. at the Waterfront Park. Check out the cool collection of rare cars without heated seats, cd players, and automatic windows. Talk with owners as they show with pride a Ford Mustang or Thunderbird.

Speaking of classic cars, have you heard of The Great Race? Gardiner will host a stop on the 2018 Great Race. The Great Race, the world's premiere classic car rally, will bring more than 100 antique automobiles to Historic Downtown Gardiner and the Waterfront Park. Gardiner Main Street and The Kennebec Valley Chamber of Commerce are proud to help Gardiner play host city for the race participants and event-goers. The race annually draws more than 500 participants who make up the 120 teams – driver, navigator, support team and truck. Food trucks will be on hand to feed the 3000-plus expected crowd, live music and fireworks round out the event. To accommodate the crowds, shuttle buses will be available to transport people from Gardiner High School, which will be open for public parking that day, to downtown Gardiner.

This year's route will take drivers on a course that starts in Buffalo and continues across upstate New York and through Vermont to Burlington. The course then continues east to Mount Washington and across Maine to Gardiner, Augusta, Bangor and Bar Harbor.

The final legs of the trip will take drivers across the Canadian border into Saint John and Moncton, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Truro and Dartmouth before the rally concludes in Halifax.

The national vintage-car road race, which will run during the last week of June, on Tuesday, June 26 coincides with the region's Whatever Family Festival.

The annual Greater Gardiner River Festival takes place on Saturday, June 23. Activities run as early as 8 a.m. to as late as 10 p.m. Again this year, there will be several ways to get out on the river – from boat rides to Kayak and Paddleboard demonstrations.

Historic Water Street in Gardiner will be transformed into a pedestrian mall with artists, crafters, and specialty vendors exhibiting their products from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. Throughout the day, there will be entertainment and children's' activities at Gardiner's Waterfront Park.

Festival organizers have continued to find ways to celebrate life on the Kennebec River – both on land and water. Most activities are free to the public thanks to the area's generous sponsors. The evening concludes with fireworks.





# **World Fish Migration Day** and Earth Day

ith a population more than 5,000, Historic Gardiner is a city nestled along the picturesque Kennebec River. Gardiner's cultural past is balanced with a modern vibrancy - an active Waterfront Park, a weekly farmers' market and a dynamic downtown that includes a mix of shops. offices, restaurants and a performing arts center. Its central location and proximity to Augusta and Portland makes it an ideal place to visit.

Gardiner's growth is due in part to its intentional efforts centered on building cultural connections, promoting wellness and recreation, growing local business, ensuring a vibrant and welcoming community for all and preserving its history and heritage.

In April two unique events unfold, World Fish Migration Day and Earth Day on Saturday, April 21. World Fish Migration Day is a one-day global event to create awareness of the importance of open rivers and migratory fish. Local organizations rally around this day with various activities. In Gardiner, Upstream, a local non-profit working to restore fish passage and ecological health to Cobbossee Stream will host a Fish March and Clean-up on Cobbossee Stream from 10 a.m. to noon in downtown Gardiner. Those interested in helping with cleaning and picking up litter should meet on Bridge Street.

Nature and art converge for "Together is Better: The Marvel and Mystery of Fish Migration," an art show hosted by Monkitree Gallery. Artwork focused on the magic, mystery and wonder of millions of migratory fish returning to their natal streams in the spring has been created and the sale of the work will support upstream work to restore fish passage on the Cobbossee.

"This show brought together artists, community members and children who contributed to the theme of Together is Better. Just like the fish migrating together, fish passage on the Cobbossee will only happen if we come together," says Clare Marron, owner of Monkitree. The show opens on Friday, April 20 with

the Artist Reception taking place on Friday, April 27 at 5:30-8 p.m.

Also on Saturday, April 21, several independent music stores will take part in Record Store Day. Record Store Day is held on one Saturday every April and aims to celebrate the culture of the independently-owned record store. Gardiner, as part of this celebration, will again host the annual Music Walk bringing diverse musicians to downtown Gardiner.

In addition to special record releases at Niche, Inc. organizer of the Music Walk, at 1p.m. musician Jack Duggins kicks off a day of performances at Canton Village Restaurant. At 2 p.m. bring your own drum or just watch the fun at the drum circle performance at Dearborn Park (locally known as Johnson Park). Main activities start at 4 p.m. and folks are encouraged to take part in the festivities by visiting host businesses that will feature musicians playing everything from Jazz, Country and Folk to Indie American.

Also starting at 4 p.m. Craft Beer Cellar will have free tasting of Dogfish Head, the official beer of Record Store Day.

A collection of the world's most famous guitars such as Gibson's Les Paul, will be on display inside Johnson Hall, 280 Water Street, from 7-8:30 p.m. This experience will feature a collection of the iconic guitars formerly owned by Les Paul himself. Jim Wysocki, of "From Start to Finish" will give a presentation on the collection and share stories about the guitars and the legend. Music Walk will be the first time that this collection of guitars will visit the State of Maine. Don't miss this experience to see, touch, and even play the guitars! Also in Johnson Hall, Chasing Sound, a biographical film on Les Paul, starts at 1p.m.

Music lovers will enjoy this event, but there's something for everyone - bring the whole family and your friends because there will be face painting for the kiddos that starts at 3 p.m. at Johnson Park. ain Street Skowhegan is coordinating the Skowhegan Moose Festival from June 8 - June 10 at Skowhegan Fairgrounds.

The festival is designed to enhance Maine Inland Fisheries & Wildlife's Moose Permit Lottery which Skowhegan will host at the fairgrounds on June 9, 2-6 p.m.

"We're excited about this opportunity to showcase Skowhegan, which has a long heritage of hunting, fishing, and outdoor recreation," said Kristina Cannon, Main Street's executive director. "We expect to draw thousands of visitors from all over the Northeast who will stay in local lodging, eat in local restaurants and shop in local stores during the weekend-long festival."

Sponsored by Cabela's outdoor sports store and the Hight Family of dealerships, the Skowhegan Moose Festival is free to all with the exception of the Saturday evening musical performance.

The event will include many exhibits, demonstrations and activities including Moose Maine-iah monster truck rides, a wild game and craft brew pairing and tasting, Axe Women Loggers of Maine shows, a K-9 field demo, an archery range, a moose calling competition, kids' activities, raffles, and more.

Following the moose permit lottery drawing on Saturday, country music stars Phil Vassar and Bryan White will perform on the fairgrounds stage at 7 p.m. Concert admission is \$35 in advance and \$45 at the gate. Tickets can be purchased online at SkowheganMooseFest. com/entertainment or at Skowhegan locations including Computer Improvements (101 Water St.), Hight Ford (242 Madison Ave.), and Main Street Skowhegan (48 Court St.).



n Saturday, Sept. 1, a block in the heart of downtown Skowhegan will close to traffic from 2-7 p.m. as an anticipated 30 purveyors of Maine craft beer. wine, cider and spirits take to the streets at the third annual Skowhegan Craft Brew Festival.

The event will kick off with a VIP hour 2-3 p.m. featuring specialty brews not available during the general session 3-7 p.m. with free food samples from vendors specializing in local harvest. The general session will include an array of Maine-crafted libations. while merchants will offer farm-to-table fare such as wood-fired pizza, local chicken wings, and poutine.

The Nikki Hunt Band will perform throughout the festival. A pop/rock group based in Central Maine, Nikki Hunt covers artists Sheryl Crow, Joan Jett, Bruce Springsteen, Sublime, No Doubt, The Doors, U2, and others. Hunt is also known to show off her hula-hooping skills during performances.

Guided tours of Maine Grains at the Somerset Grist Mill will round out this Labor Day weekend event, one of the only festivals in the state featuring only Maine producers of beer, wine, cider, and spirits. This will make for an unforgettable close to summer.


